Christmas Soirée – 1st December

The Sherborn Room at the Bishop's Palace was the venue for our Christmas evening. Last year we had to 'socially distance' but this time we could mingle and chat with friends old and welcome new members to the Friends of Chartres, though the very large and comfortable sofas at the far end of the room proved hard to leave for some. We had a box of cheese



and bread for refreshment along with the wine provided. **Bishop Martin** came along and did a marvellous job of speaking to as many as he could.

David Nason spoke about the wood ceiling and panels in the room. In case you are unaware, the ceiling panels were painted by Lambert Barnard between 1524 and 1528. The initials of H and K –King Henry the 8th and Queen Katherine can be seen and help date when the ceiling was completed. Such painted ceilings were fashionable during the late medieval period and this room was meant to impress—for official business, entertaining visitors, and formal dining.



Afterwards, **David Nason** took us to see the Bishop's Chapel. This building is part of the Palace and not the Cathedral and dates from the 12th Century. It has remained in daily use for nearly 800 years and is where Bishop Martin celebrates mass each day. What is of note is a relic of St Richard held there. His shrine and grave were desecrated by the Reformation but a small part of his body was returned and now kept in the Chapel. Many thanks to David for his interesting talk on the two rooms.

Touring Returns: Chamber Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra Choir and Sleepy Lagoon Orchestra visit Chartres

After a break of two years, orchestral and choir tours resumed with a concert trip to our twin city of Chartres. This was our fourth visit to this lovely cathedral city to perform with the Grand Coeur du Conservatoire de Chartres, 80 musicians from Chichester performing together with 50 singers from Chartres was certainly going to be a spectacle.

Tuesday morning started early (6am yawn!) with a coach to Newhaven where we were dropped off for the ferry to Dieppe. The French coach met us there and took us to Chartres to a lovely hotel but 5 minutes after arriving we had to rush across town for the first rehearsal, our usual warm up was a trot up the hill!

On Wednesday our Chamber Choir had a lovely performance on their own in Chartres Cathedral. Director of the Choir, **John Hancorn** was delighted with the performance, "...to sing in this lovely and historic building was a wonderful experience and all the choir members relished this lovely opportunity. The audience was very receptive, especially when we sang the Ukrainian Prayer."

Thursday was something of a rest day for most, some students went to visit Paris, others the outdoor Lido to soak up the beautiful weather. An outdoor performance in the main square by our own Sleepy Lagoon Orchestra went down very well with surrounding cafes full of people enjoying the music and the sun. Director **Simon Growcott** pointed out that, "the style of music that we play, swing, has a universal appeal across all age groups and borders. It was also good to see people up and dancing in the sunshine."

Friday was the big rehearsal and the first concert all together, what a sound!!!! Carmina Burana by Carl Orff and Mozart's Requiem absolutely filled the venue, the Collegiale Saint-Andre, an amazing building and former church. Performing to 500, the queue to get in stretched around Some people were the block. disappointed and could not get a ticket. The reception was tumultuous, wonderful а



experience. Saturday's performance was even better and the Friends of Chichester together with the Grand Coeur gave us a sumptuous reception afterwards with more food and drink than was possible to consume.

Chartres is a most gorgeous city, full of welcoming people and this trip will go down as one of the most successful ever.
